Michael L: advised that there is a petition on circulation from local retail outlets. They are concerned about lost trading on Rotary Market Day. A range of retailers feel that Rotary inviting outside traders into Cooma to sell their products is detrimental to the town economy. There will be a board meeting next week to discuss how Rotary can come to some agreement with Cooma's retail businesses that will benefit both groups.

Col Adams: advises that the nursing home fete's income was approximately \$6,000 with the wine auction drawing in \$1,500 of that. Thanks to all Rotarians that donated time and wine to the fete.

Col Hackney: reported that the Dorothy and the Dinosaurs shows at the Club was a great success. Some 430 kids attended the two sessions. Rotary underwrote the show and received a commission from each ticket sale and 7.5% on merchandise sales of \$1,600. The feedback from the community has been extremely positive. The committee was commended for this quality new initiative for

Cooma Rotary Club.

Michael Lukovic: guest speaker, holder of 5 valid passports, resident of 3 continents, immigrant to Australia in 1963, gave us an insight into the current human catastrophe in Kosovo. Michael related from another point of view (not NATO's) why and how the current aggression has come about. It seems that his region has a long history of instability stemming from as far back as the sixth century. Kosovo is considered the cradle of the Serbian culture, it was where the Serbs halted the Turks in the fourteenth century. After WW2 President Tito held the various provinces known as Yugoslavia together through repression of the people, after his death the political scene changed significantly eventually leading to the current crisis. The cultural significance of Kosovo province to the Serbs is significant and one they are not prepared to relinquish their ownership.
