ROTARY INFORMATION:

The CLE approach succeeds because it makes the students the driving force behind the lessons. The third-grade classroom in Cape Town's Uitsig Primary School is a beehive of activity. About 25 children, most wearing clean, blue shirts or blouses, jostle for position as they crowd around their teacher, Daphne Ray Meissenheimer. All eyes are focused on the object in her hands: a large, loose-leaf book, its words carefully hand-printed in Afrikaans, the Dutch-derived language spoken by many South Africans. This school is one of seven Cape Town sites where more than 130 teachers in grades one through three have been trained in CLE techniques a pilot project funded by Rotary Foundation.
