Items about India - Mark Cooper

n September 2009 the three Cooper Brothers (Steven, Craig and the voungest Mark), three friends from Australia and two American biker friends set off to ride the highest trafficable roads in the world. Situated in the Himalayan mountains in Ladakh and Shrinigar in Northern India on the disputed border with Pakistan. The idea was to ride ap-

proximately 4000 kms in 23 days, taking in the high altitude deserts of Ladakh and Shrinigar. Once we left Shimla, the roads altitude quickly went to 3000m and for the next 15 days we were well above 4000 meters. The highest sleeping point was 4600m in a roadside daba (tent) at Pang. Most of the passes we rode over were over 5000m with the highest point reached at Khardung La Pass at 18380 ft or well over 6000m (the highest road in the world). At this point we were much higher than base camp at Mt Everest. This area is in and around Leh which is currently experiencing the worst floods on record with over 88 persons killed due mainly to mud slides. This area has a usual annual rain fall of 0mm. These flood waters are currently flowing down the Indus River into Pakistan where more and worse flooding is occurring. From Leh we rode along the Pakistan border where signs warned us that we were under enemy observation, through Kargil, Drass and into the Shrinigar Valley. We

spent a few days on a houseboat taking in the sights. From Shrinigar to Chamba and back to Shimla where we closed the loop and to all intents and purposes finished our tour. The only thing left to do was make our way back to Delhi and drop off the hire bikes, a quick trip down to the Taj Mahal.
