Experience in Middle East - Fiona Sacco

uest speaker was Fiona Sacco a Berridale girl who is now back in Berridale assisting her husband Patrick with the business. They both lived in Sydney for ten years and after getting married, decided on a climate change to Dubai for two years. Fiona informed us that the United Arab Emirates consists of seven territories, of which Dubai is one

(members couldn't identify the other six). It is estimated the UAE has a population of six million, but only 1.5 million are Emirate nationals, and the other 4.5 are Indians, Pakistanis. Filipinos, Chinese, Iranians and other expats. Fiona said that when they arrived, Dubai was a hot dusty construction site. Patrick had a job with a construction management company specialising in construction projects, it was a good job but with very long hours and a fair bit of travel. Fiona gave us a report on two projects. The Formula 1 Theme Park which was announced in 2007 in Dubai's bid to host the world famous Formula 1 Grand Prix which was successful. In two years they needed to deliver a fully operational town including infrastruc-



ture, electrical, wastewater, a Formula 1 race track, a marina and Formula 1 Theme Park (the second in the world) and eight luxury hotels, to be further developed into 22 hotels. They wanted the biggest and the best of everything, the cost not being an issue. The second was the Tiger Woods Golf

Course: *one world class par 72 championship golf course, *seven star, 80 suite boutique hotel, *21 exclusives palaces, *100 large villas - 95 serviced villas, *80.000 square foot clubhouse, *elite golf academy and sports clinic, *luxury day spa with 15 bungalows. Challenges of creating a golf course in the desert: 80 hectares of turf was grown in the US and transported to Dubai, and the amount of water used to hold the sand in place was ludicrous. By the time they left at the end of last year the project was 18 months in and hadn't really got off the ground due to financial constraints and Tiger's reputation. Fiona thinks it is now a forgotten pro-

ject. She said it was a harsh environment and society, with extreme temperatures of 50% air-conditioning, working all hours, sleepless nights due to construction noise, and then Allah's call at sunrise from the several different denomination mosques in the area. Racism and injustice everywhere, disparity between extreme wealth and extreme poverty. She then informed us of problems driving with a guy slamming his brakes on in front of her on purpose, if she would have hit his car it would have been her fault as she was an expat and a pregnant lady whose car was driven into by an Emigrant, she lost the baby and had to pay blood many to the government as she was considered responsible for the babies death.
