Three Minuter - Robbyn Crooks

obbyn spoke on the Australian Red Cedar, a special forest tree that can grow to 60 metres in height and 3 metres in girth. The largest recorded tree was near Nulla-Nulla Creek -west of Kempsey and down south to about Ulladulla and also Norfolk Island. One of the few native deciduous trees. Used for furniture, wood paneling, construction and ship building. Unfortunately it was heavily exploited in 19th to 20th century and almost all large trees have been cut down. The majority of old, antique Australian furniture tended to be made from Red Cedar. Early furniture makers such as Andrew Lenehan, Hunt & Co, Temple, Webster and Joseph Sly, signed their product Sly impressed SLY



on it. Robbyn said Provenance's the ability to trace furniture from its beginning. She said it must be in its original state, the worst thing you can do is sand it back and lacquer it. If you have a few old pieces in the back shed, don't be tempted to sand it back and repair it. If it is a rare piece it needs to be properly restored and documented.
