### **Future Education Options - Phil Stubbs**

uest speaker was the Principal of St Pats School, Phil Stubbs, After leaving school he commenced work with a French Bank, sights firmly set on an international banking career. Politics intervened, when he was called up for National Ser-

vice. Phil graduated from Officer training as a 2nd Lieutenant and worked on bases in Victoria and NSW. On leaving the army, went to university majoring in geography and economics, taught at several schools, including Monaro High and the last 20 years at St Pats as Coordinator and now Principal. Throughout his many years in education the one constant that he found is change, and perhaps never more evident than in the last five or six years. He then went on and explained BER the much maligned "school halls program", NAPLAN (National Assessment Program in Literacy and Numeracy), National Curriculum and the Overcrowded Curriculum. Who is going to teach our chil-



dren? At the moment there is a drought affecting the teaching profession and if industry experts are to be believed, its going from bad to worse. After five or six years most young teachers will hit their salary ceiling and this can be quite disenchanting, with many deciding to pack up and leave for more lu-

crative international teaching positions or change occupations completely. A Federal Government report shows that Australia could even reach the stage where more teachers are leaving than their younger graduate fellows are arriving. This will not effect primary schools as much as secondary schools, with subjects such as technology, maths and science experiencing the crunch in fewer teachers. The average age of today's teacher is 43, and Australia could be looking at losing up to 30,000 teachers

in the next 10 years. Many English speaking countries are having similar problems including Britain, USA, Canada and New Zealand. He said in recent times more teachers have gone on strike demanding more pay, which it is hoped, would bring more teachers into the fold and while some incentives exist to attract teachers to specific areas, most will agree that more has to be done. Technology provides many of the answers (but not all). Teachers must be constantly trained in emerging technologies. Human presence is indispensable to provide support and direction, no matter how much technology a child is surrounded by. Other solutions can come through better teacher training, adequate financial rewards and a clearly defined career path and the mentoring of students still at school who display an interest and aptitude in teaching. Phil said he is impressed with the commitment and dedication of the teachers who he works with and when he looks back on 34 years in education he can reflect on a career where he hopes he made a difference to some students lives.
