tion had been successful. The Faculty of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources was the beneficiaries of \$8.6 million from a deceased estate. Further development of technology known as "Flux" towers will enable widespread measurements of emissions from industrial activities and the success of farmers and grazers to sequester carbon in the soil. From this information the eligibility of a farmer to claim carbon credits be determined. In the fast "Flux" towers have been stationary, units in the new models are mobile and the cost is halved. Success of the grant application has added income security due to the bequest and increasing profitability at Coolringdon which will enable greater continuity of research effort both at Coolringdon and in the



Highfire Project on Snowy Plain. Improved rural prospects and a rising awareness of the importance of food security for the future in raising public awareness of agriculture. 
