Guest Speaker: Georgie Hatfield and Dominic Bogatec An Orphanage in South America

Georgie and Dominic shared with us their life changing experience of a trip to South America. On the first stage they met up with former exchange student Mavis and her husband Hendrika Hatfield. They had an amusing experience with their first taxi drive who asked them "Aren't all Australians black?". They also spent a couple of months in Ecuador to improve their Spanish.

They witnessed many amazing and unbelievable thing. They said that they often heard about protests and political battles but in Huaraz, Peru they actually saw it. The whole town closed down as people were protesting to stop the President's son selling off their rights to pure, fresh water. The average salary is around \$2,000 per year so imaging the poverty that exists. They visited what they described as a one telephone town where

Names were announced over a loud speaker for incoming calls. In this town there is a small child refuge, where they spent 5 months. The western influence there has facilitated rises in alcohol abuse which in turn leads to sexual abuse, lack of affection, the crumbling foundations of culture. The children are lacking opportunities for education, they are malnourished and have limited protection from the harsh elements.

Georgie and Dominic's goal was to help maintain the safe house for these children which Hendrika was involved in a few months earlier. They also mentioned the corruption that exists, where most Peruvians dealing with large amount of charity money will fill their own pockets first, while the children are lucky to get a cup of hot tea and a piece of bread for dinner.

They told us of a couple of buddies they made, Victor aged 3, lives in a cold mud brick house where guinea pigs roam and he shares a bed with his 4 siblings and has an alcoholic abusive father. Then there was Heranlinda aged 11, she has a heartbreaking story in that her family lives in a one room mud brick shack, with no light. The family of 5 share one double bed. She also had an alcoholic abusive father who accidently committed suicide as the children watched. The upside is that abuse is no longer a part of their lives.

As part of integration into the community they organised several dinners involving parents and children but were shocked to see parents stealing food from the children.

The existence of this refuge is aiding to break a cycle of alcohol abuse by providing a loving atmosphere and the influence of other perspectives such as opportunities through education. Their time at the refuge was cut short by threats by a person who didn't want the corruption exposed.

From Peru they went to Bolivia, cruised through Chilean Patagonia and went trekking and camping in the freezing wilderness. They then moved on to Argentina and ended in Mexico City then came back to Australia.

They said that this experience made them really appreciate all that we have in Australia like hot water, food that is not deep fried beans and rice. It also helped them understand the true meaning of family and how important hugs are, especially from Mum.

WE ARE PLEASED TO ANNOUNCE THAT PLACES ARE OPEN FOR OUR TRIPS IN THE 2013 SEASON

BRIEF BACKGROUND

The volunteers of The Otago Youth Adventure Trust/Rotary Club of Milton Tramping Club Inc. have now completed 26 successful seasons of organising the trips (details below), with some 16,000 people, mostly Kiwis and Aussies, having participated (many on several trips over the years). We operate as a Tramping Club on public lands and, as such, are required (by law) to run our the trips on a "cost recovery" basis only. Participants are predominately middle aged, and have to become members of our Tramping Club (\$50) in the year of their trips, and we do suggest an optional donation, to enable us to return some funds to the two Charitable Trusts that are the parent bodies of our Club. All the trips are lead and organised by unpaid volunteers, who put thousands of voluntary hours into this ongoing project to ensure we are able to run the trips at a moderate cost. We have received much National acclaim for our project.

THE TRIPS

We list below the Trips that are planned for the 2013 season. To find full details of each trip (Details, Dates, Cost, Application Forms, Contacts, etc) please go to our web site, www.otagorotarytrusttramps.org.nz. On many of the trips we take parties of up to 40 people, on a "Freedom Walk" basis. (as distinct from the Guided walks available by Commercial providers). Each of our groups is led by 3-4 experienced trampers. Transport to the starting point and from the finishing point (Dunedin return) is provided, as is all the food, though people do have to carry their share.

The Tramping Trips (Full details on web site)

- MILFORD TRACK: NZ's most famous track in Fiordland National Park. (4 5 days). 5 trips planned from January to April.
- ROUTEBURN/GREENSTONE TRACK: Another brilliant track in Fiordland and Aspiring National Parks. (6 Days). 5 trips planned from January to March.
- KEPLER TRACK: A stunning alpine track in Fiordland. (5 Days). 1 trip planned in February
- TUATAPERE HUMP RIDGE TRACK: A great new track in southern Fiordland. Coastal beaches, bush & alpine (4 days). 1 trip planned in February

RAKIURA TRACK; Stewart Island, 4 days. This years "new " trip. 4 trips, all already full up, by popular demand from the many people who come back year after year, till they have done all the trips. (Often start again) WHAT BETTER TESTIMONIAL COULD WE HAVE!!

The four trips above are Tramping Trips, where people need to carry a pack (11-12 kg), over at times some rough terrain, and consequently require a good standard of tramping fitness. We mostly use the Department of Conservation huts, which are basic, but nonetheless comfortable and very adequate for our purposes.

The "Lodge - Back to Base" Trips

- ASPIRING (TITITEA) LODGE: Situated beside Mt Aspiring National Park. A great venue for some exciting day trips. (5 Days). 3 trips
 planned from January to Easter
- HUXLEY LODGE: In the Lake Ohau area. Some superb day trips in a different environment. (5 days). 1 trip planned, Easter 2012
- CATLINS TAUTUKU LODGE: The largest OYAT outdoor education facility, in the famous Catlins area. Numerous day trips. (5 days). 1 trip in January.
- SUTTON LODGE: Also owned by OYAT. On the sun drenched Strath Taieri. Superb day trips, etc. (5 days). 1 trip planned in March.
- BORLAND LODGE: A well equipped complex in Southern Fiordland, with ample of day trips, etc. (5 days). 2 trips planned in February.

The five venues, above, are situated in beautiful remote areas, and are generally well appointed and suitable for some interesting day trips of varying grades of difficulty. Only light day packs need to be carried, and people are free to participate in whatever activity they wish. Generally our transport can deliver us, our gear and food, to the door of the Lodges.

The Otago Central Rail Trail Cycle Trips

Again we are planning two trips (January & March) on this, undoubtely the most famous Cycle Trail in NZ, in Central Otago, along the old railway line from Dunedin to Clyde, some 170km, (4 - 5 days). Backup transport for all your gear, food and accommodation is arranged, and very good bikes can be hired. No steep hills, (all Railway Grade), and eminently suited to recreational cyclists.

AS MENTIONED ABOVE, FULL DETAILS ON THE TRIPS ARE SET OUT ON OUR WEB SITE. MANY TRIPS FILL UP RAPIDLY, AND IT IS A CASE OF "FIRST IN, FIRST SERVED".
