Guest Speakers: Allan Fjording - Snowy Mountains Christian School A New Option for Year 11 & 12 on the Monaro

This week our guest speaker was Allan Fjording, Principle of the Snowy Mountains Christian School. He was with us to share the new option for Year 11 and 12 SMCS are hoping to implement in 2014. He started by telling us about himself. He was born in Copenhagen, Denmark and he is 3rd generation Fjording. His grandfather decided that he wanted to change the family name from Hansen to Fjord. But to change your name to another family name you had to have permission from the family, so as this permission was not forthcoming it was changed to Fjording instead. Allan moved to Adelaide SA and gained his degree in teaching. His first post was to a small town in Tasmania, after a period of time he moved to Thailand with the brief - make a high school. He left Australia with his wife and returned some years later with his wife and 3 daughters.

SMCS opened in 1997 and has always been determined to provide schooling though to Year 12. The school is affiliated with the Baptist church but it is not a church school, you don't have to be a Baptist to attend. The school is currently in the process of acquiring registration and accreditation to provide year 11 and 12 subjects, with the Board of Studies and Christian Schools Australia. They are proposing 2 different modes of study but both will cover the required 22 units, including 2 units of English, for completing the HSC. Model #1 is called 50/50. This means 1st year is 12 units of year 11 and 2nd year has 10 year 12 units culminating in exams or final pieces of work. This model is the traditional way of studying HSC. Model #2 is Focused. What this means is that 1st year consists of 3 subjects which are studied to completion and 2nd year repeats this with 3 different subjects. The advantage of this model is that the student only has to focus on 3 subjects at a time rather than multiple subject in each year. It has the same quantity and time frame as the 50/50 model but in a different structure. Is it efficient, has a high success rate and reduced stress levels.

The school anticipates supplying a number of face to face classes and a large choice of subjects without impacting on other schools in the area by co-operating with Monaro High to develop a program where students from both schools can have access to subjects of interest and attend both school campuses, Cooma TAFE and the Northern Beaches Christian School (NBCS). The NBCS is Board of Studies accredited and is experienced in offering online courses, it has students from over 80 different schools and has successfully delivered over 1500 courses. At this point in time Allan foresees that the program they wish to develop will be a combination of both models to ensure the widest choice of subjects are available for students which in turn creates an environment where all students can achieve the outcomes they desire. Whether that is to continue on to university, move into a trade or to join the workforce.

Tamara said - Well first of all I'd just like to thank Rotary for giving me the opportunity to go to RYPEN and meet so many great people and have such a wonderful experience. It was truly a once in a lifetime opportunity and I hope to return next year as a leader and give others the same opportunity and inspiration that the leaders there have given me. So on to what we got up to. The trip up was a nice guiet one, mum and dad got a holiday as a result and Penny and I did as well. To start we had the ice breakers, I forgot to take the advice of wearing shorts ...and as a result the ice breaker involving a spoon and cd was quite interesting...but I wasn't the only one, my entire team was wearing skinny jeans so we weren't exactly victorious in that respect.
