Guest Speakers: Mick Joffe - Historian and Artist Intro: John K Thanks: Dugald M

Our guest speaker this week was Mick Joffe. He is a life member of the Rotary Club of Oberon and he describes himself as an enthusiastic amateur caricature artist and author. He has produced several books including his latest Living Treasures of the Snowy Mountains. He has put an enormous amount of himself into gathering the words of the old people of the area and of the movers and shakers of the Monaro. This new book is a very important collection of Monaro history and Mick has written it in the words of the people who have told the stories. The book contains 198 stories but he feels that he missed at least 400 other people in their 60's and 70's which he could has spoken too. The hat he wears is his working hat and always wears it when doing pictures. He asked Robb S to sit for him so he could demonstrate what it is he does with his art work. He started drawing about the age of 6 and is self taught. He said that when he has drawn someone and interviewed someone it is known as being "Joffed". He said that he would draw Robb with slightly less hair than he has now so the picture still looks like him in 6 months time. The first book he did was called "Yarns and Photos" and this was about the folk on the Hawkesbury River and has interviews with over 200 people and a serious amount of photos. He has interview 100 centurions over his time. These people offer gems as you don't know where the story will go. He started interviewing a lady about a boat shed and ended up talking about her cousin Ned Kelly. Over time he has interviewed about 2000 people. His second book was on Oberon, which is a trout fishing and farming area and it was a labour of love for the Oberon Rotary Club and was an awesome fundraiser. The third book was a titled "Endangered Characters of Australia" and was written over a two year period while travelling around Australia with his wife and 4 redheaded children in a fire brigade troop carrier. This book has a lot of known people including Val and Ron Taylor and Lindy Chamberlin but Mick preferred interviewing the unknown person. Another book is called "Living Relics of Australia" which is stories from people aged 90+. This book includes stories from Nancy Bird, Nancy Wake, Vivian Bullwinkle, an amazing cross section of Australians. The Snowy book was launched in Berridale with 300 people in attendance. He started interviewing in 2009 and now it has just been launched - it involved 5 years of his life and 18 trips to the Monaro. The first story in the book is on the Pendergast brothers who encapsulate the families of the area, with old world values and virtues. He was a bit biased in who he interviewed as he wanted to speak with the oldest people on the Monaro before their stories were lost. He believes in making a fuss of the old now not at the graveside because they can't hear you then. And he would like if someone or someone's else would pickup the baton and speak to others who have Monaro history to share before they pass on.

The names in the book mean a lot to many still living in the area but also provide a real insight to life "back when" on the Monaro - not only are there stories but its the humour of the time too.

3 MINUTER

The 3 Minuter this week was bought to us by Ashley C. He told us about a diary he had come across written by his Grandmother's brother, Granville Thomas C Clarke. Was one of two children born at Kenilworth, near Springfield, Nimmitabel in the late 1890's. According to his diary he worked on the family property and neighbouring properties until the outbreak of World War 1. At this time, like many young Australian men, seeking adventure, the chance to travel and serve King and Country, he joined up. He was one of the many men who participated in the Snowy River March which originated in Delegate. Along with him was Ernie Corey, who went on to become a MC recipient. On completion of basic training he was shipped to Egypt and then onto the Western Front in France, little did he know what was in store for him. According to the diary he was a typical Australian soldier with a larrikin attitude but he made no mention of the horrors or sights that he must have encountered when on the front line. From notes in the diary and from postcards he sent back he certainly did mention the good times he had in Paris and in England. In 1917 his battalion was defending a small area in Southern Belgium this area was known as Polygon wood and this was the third battle fought over this area resulting in the loss of thousands of Australian and Allied lives. He last entry in 1917 stated he was in good humour but the German barrage were a constant annoyance. The next day Granville suffered a direct hit from an artillery shell and his body was never recovered and he has no known grave. Four years ago Ashley had the privilege of visiting Ypres with the Dennyis family. While he was staying with the Dennyis family they found Granville's name on the Menin gate memorial. Ashley was able to place a poppy and a cross beside Granville's name. To this day Ashley is the closest relative to have visited the memorial site. He is still amazed that with so much time having passed that the French and Belgium's still hold Australians and the Australian soldier in such high regard and with such fond memories. Ashley recalled an incident in Brussels when Thomas D was trying to get directions from an elderly, elegantly dress lady. Thomas was speaking French and this lady kept looking at Ashley and Thomas made mention that his friend was Australian. In perfect English this lady said "Ah the Australians" so obviously we left a long and lasting memory over there.


