Paige comes from Indiana, the Pink State. Her hometown is Carmel which has a population of 80,000 people and is about 1 hour north of Indianapolis. This is the town that hosts the Indy 500 the famous and very loud motor race. She loves sports and the teams she supports are the Pacers in the National Basketball League and the Colts in the National Football League. She was part of her University's basketball team which one the State Championship. A torn ACL finished her basketball career. Her college team is currently number 1 in the US.

Her immediate family consists of her parents and a brother. Her father is a school principal, her mother is a special education teacher and her brother is still studying. She enjoys water skiing and her family has a cottage on a lake where they spend holidays together. In Winter they enjoy building snowmen.

She graduated from the University of Indiana in December last year with a Bachelor of Science and Education. She was part of an exclusive special education teaching program, only 40 people a year are accepted into this course. This exchange program she is participating in is very popular and she didn't really expect to be selected. There are 17 countries to choose from and once you have been accepted and selected the country you would like to travel too you have to do 6 research projects and a 3 day workshop which specialises in cultural differences. While you are in your chosen country you then complete a second set of 6 assignments, these focus on current events and cultural differences. These projects also count towards 12 credit points in a Masters program.

Schools in the States are quite different to schools in Australia. The school is all in one building, you walk in and the first thing you see is the office and then there are hallways containing the classrooms, gym and media centre (library). There are 3 levels of schools before you go to college, these are Elementary School which is Kinder to Year 5, Middle School which is Year 6 to Year 8 and then High School which is Year 9 to Year 12. She gave an example of a school which had 760 students ranging from Kinder to Year 6, there were 45 teachers, plus a Physical Education teacher, an Art teacher and a Music teacher. There were also teacher's aides, a nurse, counsellors, cooks, custodians (cleaners), secretaries and home school liaison personal. The school day starts about 8am and finishes about 2.30pm.

One of the major differences she has observed is the number of breaks Australian children have. She feels that this contributes to a better learning environment. She loves being around and teaching children and learns so much from them.


She will spend the next 8 weeks teaching at Cooma North Primary before taking some time to travel around the country with her boyfriend.

Another point He feels worth reminding member of is the term "knife and forkers" referring to members who appear to come just for a meal each week and do little else. In his year as President, International President Bhichai Rattakul made mention of this in his first address. He pointed out that a club is made up of all members each contributing in a different way. Some may be retired, some employed full-time, some self-employed, some with young families, some more financial than others, some considerably older or more able bodied than others. All contribute in their own way, if only to provide social friendship by sharing a meal each week. So don't discount anybodies contribution to the club. We are all vital members and remember "Family comes first". Lou would like to encourage every member to consider the fact that the more you put in the more you get out.

To finish he said he has thoroughly enjoyed his time as part of Cooma Rotary and that we have a reputation as "The most fun club" in District 9710 - so let's keep it that way.
