

# Guest Speaker - John Bowe - Modern Landscape Gardening Intro: Katrin H Thanks: Margaret E

John has been involved in the nursery industry most of his working life. He said horticulture is an old science, it has been around for a long time. They have been cloning plants for 100's of years. The industry in Australia started out as small, non-scientific Mum and Dad operations. Most transactions were done through mail order. The plants were grown in the open ground, dug up and posted out. He showed us a catalogue from the late 1800's, the nursery was located in Pitt Street, Sydney and they had a couple of farms "out in the sticks" at Gosford and Randwick. They provided a large range of products which included cut flowers, seeds and seedlings, delivered through the post via mail order.

Containers for plants included jam tins or terracotta pots, which were considered very high tech. Soil and soil mediums were top soil based for use in containers. Following WWII there were major advancements in pots though the development of plastic pots. Plastic pots allowed plants to be put into containers in a more affordable manner which meant they were available to the public to purchase as an impulse buy compared to having to make an order through the mail and having to wait for it to arrive.

The soil which was originally used in containers created some problems as it was stagnant, which was not good for plant health. This lead to the development of composed mixes which allowed water and air to move though, keeping the plant healthy. Fertilizers were also an issue which guided the development of slow release fertilizers we know today.

The industry in the 1970's & 80's was booming due to the development of suburbia. You could grow and sell virtually anything. During this time the nursery retailer evolved as a go between for the grower and the buyer as specialised growers developed. Marketing and promotion also increased and now plant labels read like an encyclopaedia of plant information. The industry went from small operations to large ones and a lot of people made plenty of money.

During the mid 2000's the industry suffered a blow from drought and politics. Due to the drought people started to feel bad about planting things as they needed water to survive. In Canberra severe and strict water restrictions were put in place so this also inhibited people from putting in new plantings. But time has moved on and we are now back to better than average conditions and consumers confidence in planting is improving. There have been some significant changes though, people are returning to independent growers and retailers. This is because the independent is usually in the same area as the buyer and they can supply advice and information relevant to specific plants and areas. Personal service and local product are once again becoming valued by the consumer.

In a very hands-on industry the Internet is providing an unexpected boon as people now use it to reach growers and view the wares available, it is like the industry is "going back to the future" by showing what is around and having people order and getting the products delivered to their homes.
