

Neil B is travelling to Nepal with his friend Ongchuu Sherpa on 18 May. A collection to support them resulted in an amount of \$840. Both Peter and Neil spoke about the people, their generosity of spirit, their resilience and their independence, amid poor living conditions which are the norm for so many Nepalese. The devastation of the earthquake has added to the difficulties. 1700 shelter boxes and 2700 shelter box kits have been sent to Kathmandu, but there is much work to do.

GUEST SPEAKER: Dr Anne Lehnert

In her talk on birds in our culture, Anne spoke of the reasons that they hold such attraction for us: their diversity, colour, ability to fly and their song. She mentioned five areas where they have figured in our history, art, symbolism, mythology, sport and science, highlighting the first three of these areas.

Representations of birds have been found in caves, dating from thousands of years ago. Birds have been used to depict the soul and regarded as go-betweens, messengers, harbingers and wonders of nature. In various cultures, different birds symbolise wisdom, knowledge, hysteria and fear, fertility, love and sweetness, divine providence, temptations of the flesh, souls in paradise and they feature in the Tree of Life.
