Ash described the journey through breast cancer treatment that Brenda and he have taken in the last nine months. Both Brenda and Ash were overwhelmed by the amount of support available in the community. Rotarians, friends, neighbours have all offered help. McGrath Breast Care Nurse, Fiona, was invaluable with her advice and care. The Cooma Craft Group donated cushions, including a special heart shaped one. The MCCR offered support. Bega Hospital medical stuff, the Oncology Unit at Cooma Hospital, the Cooma Emergency Department were all amazing. The Isolated **Patient Assistance Scheme is part of Canberra's** medical facilities and offers free accommodation during treatment there. Brenda's mother and sister, both of whom have medical expertise, researched our health system when they heard about Brenda's diagnosis. They are very impressed with what is available in Australia when compared with the British systems. Ash thanked everyone for all the support and offers of help that Brenda and he have received.

Nutfield Scholarship Reunion's Visit to China
Howard was introduced by friend and school
mate, Richard L. The Nutfield Farming
Scholarship Trust was founded by Lord Nutfield
(William Morris of Morris car fame) in 1947.
Howard received his scholarship in 1974. Other
'feathers' in Howard's cap include Lake William,
Lake Wallace, the bell for Nimmitabel,
Catchment Management Authority. He received
his OAM for services to the State Council of the
Royal Agricultural Society of NSW.

Howard thanked David Byrne for inviting him to Rotary and for assistance with technical aspects of his presentation. His scholarship trip in 1974 was very stimulating and Howard is very proud of his green Nutfield cap.

Howard commented Australia has a great connection with China but we do not understand its culture well enough. There is little recorded about the Chinese activities on the Monaro which is disappointing. Everything in China is changing very quickly. Roads and apartment blocks are being constructed everywhere. 'In China anything is possible'. China's landmass is 25% bigger than Australia. It has 1.35 Billion people including some very wealthy ones. China is the world's second largest food producer and the largest food importer. They are passionate about food safety and security. The single child policy is relaxing but a second child is very expensive. Pollution is a major problem. They are making every effort to clean up their country which is all owned by the government. Renewable energy is huge. Australia has a very clean and green image in China. The Reunion Group first arrived in Singapore which Howard thought a little sterile. It is the doorway to Asia and is a huge training hub. All people speak English and human capital is its only resource. Hong Kong is very crowded and is losing its lustre since returning to Chinese rule. In northern China there are 50 different ethnic minorities. Small peasant farms are disappearing to make way for broad acre farms, collectives and cooperatives, some agricultural power houses of 10,000 hectare. People are being rehoused in apartment blocks, some 50 stories high. Every inch of land is used. Nestles has a \$200 million dairy complex, also an education centre. The Chinese are not used to milk but its use is increasing. For Howard the highlight was the Grand Farm, a conglomerate presided over by a very impressive young lady. It has storage for the 150 tons of beef imported each year, 450000 lambs, 3000 employees and is also a research station. One of the biggest markets covers 100 acres. Bananas are the world's most traded fruit. At one port there was a seven story high grain storage. Movement of trains, machinery, etc was done by computer banks in the control tower. Tourism is developing.. The Chinese are a very friendly, welcoming people. It is a beautiful country. Many old wooden structures are very ornate. There is huge potential for agriculture.
