GUEST SPEAKER: Peter Davis

Peter spoke about his vocation as a grazier, the skills needed and getting into the business of grazing.

While he has been a grazier for 40 years he has had many occupations including service station attendant, rouseabout, wool presser, plant operator, fencer, steel rigger, mechanical and civil engineering design draftsman, survey chainman and draftsman, trek leader on the Kokoda Track, expedition leader for the Australian Army History Unit, real estate trader, share trader, property developer, project manager, helicopter crewman, explorer, and construction worker. He has a Certificate in Farm Management, Diploma of Mechanical Engineering, three pilot licences, M. Phil. in History and is currently studying for a PhD in military history. He has been a volunteer with the RFS for 40 years, and is now a crew leader, instructor, and Air Attack Supervisor.



Peter spoke about the number of farms being reduced Australia-wide, but the average size of the farms has increased. In the 30 years to 2011, the number of farmers declined by 40%, one of the problems being the lack of young people to carry on the family farm.

Peter and Narelle run a farm of 4750 acres or 19.2 kms², with 29km of electric fencing, 27 km of underground pipes, 5 water supply schemes, 46 paddocks, 3 sets of sheep yards, 1 set of cattle yards plus a vast arrange of tools and equipment including a plane.

To be a grazier, the following are needed: suitable land, capital, work ethic, business skills, stockmanship, and understanding of many sciences, a 'can do' attitude, communication skills, ability to learn, tenacity, sales skills, faith in yourself, flexibility, and some luck.

A typical well-run property might have a return on equity of 2% - so it's not for the faint-hearted. Farmers' typical incomes are low compared to other forms of employment. Often profits are ploughed (pun excused, Peter) back into the business and so are difficult to measure.
